This corner of the Curriculum & Instruction monthly newsletter will focus on questions specific to our English Learners. This month, the Q & A will address myths related to EL's.


Myth #1: When an English Learner is able to communicate in English socially with friends and teachers, they are proficient in English. Truth #1: It can take English Learners between 7-11 years to become completely proficient in English. This is especially true when it comes to academic language found in content classes. Students who have access to language supports provided by an ESL staff member and their content teacher tend to show more progress than those students who are not given the language support.

Myth #2: Until students learn English, there is no point in teaching them in content area subjects.

Truth #2: English Learners need to continue learning in academic subjects. One of the best ways to teach EL's content (math, science, social studies, etc.) is to teach in the target language (English in Fairfield) by teachers who use good teaching strategies.

Edcite has a New Look

Over the summer, the team at Edcite worked on a new look. You will notice that now when you login, your classes are the first thing to show up.

Click each section of the new ribbon at the top of Edcite to find items. For example, under 'Content' you will find My Assignments, My Questions, etc. A 'Reports Hub' has been added to speed up the process of finding your data. 'Common Assessments' allows you to find the assessments you would like to assign, quickly and efficiently. 'My Questions' is improved as well. An example of this is Fill in the Blank questions. Click on 'Create a Question' and select 'Fill in the Blanks'. See what it looks like now!

As you can see, the process for creating your questions is much simpler. The pencil icon is clearly marked. 'Set Answer' is next to 'Edit' so you can toggle between them, and the gear helps with scoring. The one item you will really like is the 'Student View'.

Before you had to click on 'Preview' to see how the question would look for a student. Now you can toggle between the views.

We think you will find this improved Edcite much easier to navigate and use. If for any reason you still like the old interface, click on

and go back to the way it looked before.
