COMMITTEE REPORTS

A. Legislative Update – Balena Shorter

HB 239

Beginning with the class of 2022, eliminates the requirement that high school students take a nationally standardized college admission assessment for graduation Beginning with the class of 2023, reduces the number of end-of-course exams required for graduation from five to four For the 2020-2021 school year only, prohibits student retention under the Third Grade Reading Guarantee Passed in House on 5/28/20. Went to Senate. Was referred to Senate Education Committee on 9/1/20.

Report Cards

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) announced the 2020 Ohio School Report Cards are expected to be released on Sept. 15. The report cards will not have grades or ratings due to provisions in House Bill 197. The Ohio Department of Education's annual schools' report cards don't feature any grades for districts or buildings this year.

The ODE says the 2020 reports cards for districts and buildings do not contain overall grades, individual grades or ratings for given components or performance measures.

"The report cards also do not include any information about student performance on state tests, the academic growth of students during the school year and the extent to which achievement gaps are being addressed for students. This is in keeping with legislation passed as a result of the coronavirus pandemic that also canceled the administration of most state tests for the last portion of the 2019-2020 school year," the ODE released in a statement.

The 2020 edition of grades does feature information on graduation rates, Prepared for Success indicators and some other measures.

CARES Act Funding

The United States Department of Education has quietly dropped a controversial rule directing states to give private schools a bigger share of federal <u>coronavirus</u> aid known as CARES Act K-12 emergency relief funds. The rule was struck down by U.S. District Judge Dabney Friedrich, and she indicated in her summary judgment that it would be applied nationwide. She stated that, "In enacting the education funding provisions of the CARES Act, Congress spoke with a clear voice, and the Education Secretary did not follow the law when she changed the formula for distributing the funds to private schools. Friedrich was the third judge who ruled against the Education Secretary on the rule. Two earlier cases were heard in Washington and California, and both judges put a hold on the implementation of the rule in limited areas of the country. Friedrich's decision covered the entire country and ordered that the rule be vacated.

Background

The case involved the distribution of about \$13.5 billion that Congress included in its \$2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (Cares) Act, passed in March, to mitigate economic damage from the coronavirus pandemic. Lawmakers from both parties said that most of the Cares Act's K-12 education funding was intended to be distributed to public and private elementary and secondary schools using a formula based on how many poor children they serve that had long been used for distributing federal aid. But DeVos said she wanted money sent to private schools based on the total number of students in the school, not how many students from low-income families attended. That would have sent hundreds of millions of dollars more to private schools than Congress had intended. Hence the fight.
