

The Fairfield High School Marching Band has been hosting a drum and bugle corps competition for more than 20 years. The Queen City Classic, as it was called in the beginning, was held at Galbraeth Field, located just north of King's Island. In 1996 the drum corps show was moved to the University of Cincinnati's Nippert Stadium and the name of the event was officially changed to, "The SUMMER MUSIC GAMES in Cincinnati" to align with the Drum Corps International summer tour theme. In 2000, a construction project at Nippert Stadium forced us to move the event.

Many would think the choice to move the drum and bugle corps show to Fairfield Stadium would be obvious. But, there were several issues to contend with including, spectator parking, corps parking, warm-up space, restrooms, concessions, bleachers and many more. With a lot of creative thinking and the cooperation with Fairfield City's Police, Fire and Street Departments and the Fairfield City School Staff, we were able to move the event to Fairfield Stadium where it remains today.

The **spectator parking** issue was managed by having people park at the High School at 8800 Holden Blvd. and shuttling them to and from the stadium. This is not an ideal solution, especially when dealing with inclement weather. You can't simply tell folks to clear the bleachers and return to their cars. Although spectators are not charged for parking, many tell us that the inconvenience is not worth it.

The **corps vehicles parking** requires space for more than 14 tractor trailers, 30 motor coaches and several other support vehicles. This is accommodated by repositioning all of the Fairfield City School busses and maintenance vehicles and parking the corps vehicles in the Bus Compound.

We have yet to solve the issue of **warm-up space**. Each corps warms up before their performance. Some will find room in the Bus Compound while others walk down the street to find space. As a "good neighbor," we contact the local businesses and let them know about the drum corps show. It is critical that the sound from the warm-up area not reach the stadium and interfere with the corps performing.

The **restrooms** continue to be an issue even with Port-a-Lets being brought in for the event. The permanent restrooms are not handicap accessible.

We found our **concessions stands** were not adequate to serve nearly 4,000 fans and more than 1,200 drum corps members. Temporary concession stands are set-up on the north end of the stadium to supplement the existing stands. Not having potable water available in the Tempo Club concession stand is a major issue. As is the drain going to a dry well.

All seats on the home side **bleachers** are reserved for the drum corps show. It wasn't until we marked each seat using a standard 18" width, that we knew we could seat 3,859 people. Drum Corps International stipulates in their contract that ADA approved facilities should be used to host drum corps events if at all possible. Unfortunately, we do not have any handicap seating. Just getting people confined to wheel chairs into our existing stadium is a challenge. We place those requiring special seating on the track just in front of the bleachers. For the most part, they watch the drum corps show looking through the chain link fence from a vantage point of "on the ground." We
